Description of Heritage Place

The Meronyk Ukrainian Farm House is a 1 ½ storey rectangular house with horizontal log superstructure and a medium gable roof with gabled hip. It is located a few kilometers east of Smoky Lake in a field set back from Highway 28 in a cluster of farm outbuildings. It features cedar shake and plaster siding, wood shingles, original windows and doors and buttresses on exterior wall.

Heritage Value

The heritage value of the Meronyk Ukrainian Farm House lies in its association with early Ukrainian settlement in the region.

In 1899 thirty families left their village in the province of Bukovina, Ukraine and came to the Smoky Lake district. The letters home encouraged others, such as the Nickolychuks, to make the trip and settle in the district. For many their first homes were built in the traditional Ukrainian style to which they were accustomed... a two-room building, plastered with mud and whitewashed inside and out.

The land was originally claimed by Petro Feschuk who came to Canada from Austria is 1902. Just after the Depression the land was purchased by George and Wasylena Nickolychuk. George came from Ukraine in 1904 settling in the Smoky Lake region where they had family and friends. George worked on farms in the area for three years. In 1921 he met and married Wasylena Danyluk of Shandro and moved to a homestead north of Smoky Lake. They would later move to Saskatchewan to farm but returned to the Smoky Lake after the Depression. They purchased the above quarter section, but when Wasylena died within the year George moved to Smoky Lake and rented out the land. The couple had three daughters, Helen, Mary and Sadie. In 1944 Mary married Nicholas Meronyk and they took over his parents' (John and Annie Meronyk) farm five and a half miles south of Smoky Lake. In 1968 Nicholas, Mary and their only child Linda sold this farm and moved their equipment and some buildings to Mary's father's farm. Nicholas, Mary and Linda moved to Edmonton in 1969, and Linda now owns the farm with George Meronyk.



- Heritage Management Plan has begun extensive public and board consultation planned for completion by year end
- Community Design Strategies Inc. is:
 - on target to completed by March 31, 2012
